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step forward at the time that we're needed. We've done it for business. To do it for agriculture certainly isn't out of the realm of...out of the realm of this organization, of this institution, to in fact provide an incentive for people to want to move into the areas where they can be more profitable. The bill that Senator Wehrbein has addresses a lot of those issues, gives some incentives for people to take up the issue of trying to improve their life and improve the neighbors and improve the state as a whole. I think we would be remiss if we didn't cast a green light on this particular piece of legislation because it's terribly important, particularly at this time at this stage that we're in as far as the economy of the state is concerned. I know those...there will be those that maybe have some doubts about, what they say, bailing out a farmer. Well, it's really not bailing out a farmer. It's bailing out an industry. It's bailing out...helping to bail out those people who have the initiative and the entrepreneurship to want to take charge of their own destiny and be successful at it. I could...I could indicate to you a number of organizations, a number of businesses that have been started with entrepreneurship based on some help they've been able to get maybe through the local bank, through other organization, but sometimes it's difficult to do. Sometimes people have a great idea but they don't have anybody to turn to to help them to implement that idea and to put it in place. I could name you several small companies that have started out basically on a shoestring and have eventually grown in to be rather successful businesses, but they had a real tough time at the outset because of the limited amount of funds that they were able to access. Some of the same speech I'll give on my bill, but I think that it's important that you understand exactly what we're doing with this piece of legislation and, as a result of that, you're willing to support it. I don't want to take up a lot of time because I know there are other people who want to talk and many things that are said certainly will be good. With that, I thank you for allowing me to speak.
