that is part of the background for my thinking. But I guess in the scheme of things, when I ran for the Legislature and when I have ran for reelection and I've spoken with people in my district, and I have a...I have a...as Senator Cudaback said the other day, I have a lot of Republican friends, I have a lot of Democratic friends, and I like most of them. And I'm...(laughter)...and I'm...I'm going across party lines with that statement both ways. But, in any event, I think that when we come down here our job is to do the best we can to represent our constituents, to do the business of the state, represent the people. And I think that is even focused more clearly when you talk about doing the legal work for the state of Nebraska and legal work for the people of the state of Nebraska. The people's interest and the state's interest are at a higher level in my hierarchy of thinking, even though I have always been a registered member of a political party and I...and I have an interest in that party's platform and what that party stands for and, ideologically, I will try to identify with the party that I am most comfortable with ideologically. The interests of the party come one notch below, at least a notch below, the interests of the people and interests of the state in these kinds of decisions, and that's why I vote the way I do. It's not because I'm "antiparty", because I want to destroy the party system. I don't. I want to have a party system. I think it has great benefits and we don't want to destroy that. That's part of our democracy. But I don't think this decision in any way destroys the two-party system or the three-party system, if that exists as well. I don't think it does. This is a different decision in the hierarchy of how I decide to do things and, to me, if this...if this influences anybody that runs for Attorney General into thinking that your emphasis and your first priority is to do the legal work for the state, represent the people of the state to the best of your ability under the constitution and the laws, then it's worth doing. And when people campaign for this office they'll have to talk, perhaps, about what they intend to do as the Attorney General for the state. They won't be following any particular party platform and, to me, that's the way it should be. And that's why I'm voting the way I am, not because I am for or against a two-party system or for or against any Attorney General,...
