SENATOR BROMM: If...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...that's what you're free to determine.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR BROMM: Could I ask you a question, and if I run you out of time...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.

SENATOR BROMM: ...I'll put my light on.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.

SENATOR BROMM: What if we'd split the iceberg and...and half of the iceberg went away, then we could get around the other half, or is that a possibility?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Which half would you want to hold onto?

SENATOR BROMM: Well, of course, the half that...that...the part of the iceberg that was introduced by me was LB 1419.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well that's not before us right now, is it, or is it a part of this one, too?

SENATOR BROMM: Oh yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well you have total control, and I'll give you what you want that relates to your Titanic. You can...you can fashion your ship any way you want to. That wouldn't even be a part of the iceberg. So, if you want to keep that, I have no problem.

SENATOR BROMM: I'm just...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: If you keep the rest, then I have to do what I have to do. So, where are we? I'm going to put my light on.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time. Thank you, Senator Chambers.
