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prepared to do, or you can provide them some mechanism or some relief if they don't get their manufacturers statement or their title. Now realize when you buy a new car that not all of them will be a manufacturers statement that you get. You will...you can get a title from a new car. But we need to, in this case, make sure that we can do as much as we can in state law, and so far we've been able to do that, that would say it is a Nebraska transaction. And that transaction occurs because delivery occurs here. So in contract law we look at where was the point of sale. Well the point of sale can be an illusive thing when you're doing it over the telephone. Point of delivery is not dispositive, but certainly is one strong indication of where could that sale take place. To me it's a hook. Senator Chambers, now that you're done drafting,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: ...the question I'd have today, obviously, and I think that I come down, that's the reason I support the bill is, what happens if you do an Internet sales today? Whose law applies? I don't know, and my guess is that I don't think anybody can affirmatively answer that. But I do know that very few can afford to litigate that issue and find out when they're dealing with somebody in another state. This gives you some bootstrap to go after them and try to enforce the laws here. I think you're absolutely right. Is it a 100 percent sure deal? No, not at all, but it also does protect...the protection it has, I think, is the manufacturer's coming in, owning our local dealerships. So, from that point of view, I think that's a legitimate point, and people need to understand that's what they're doing. Overall, though, I think the bill does some good things. I can support that. I think it...if we don't do something, the question of, where does the sale take place, still looms. This helps answer that.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: And I would hope that Senator Bromm now has some time to interact with Senator Chambers on the amendment. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Mr. Clerk, next item.
