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question?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: The only question I have, and like I say, I'm at a disadvantage because I don't know. You never ask a question you don't know the answer to, but I don't know the answer. Does this add to the \$130 million or thereabouts that we're going to be spending on special ed, or does this just open up the window a little bit to using the 5 percent?

SENATOR BOHLKE: Right, it just allows that an increase in...it does not increase the money at all.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Okay. I just wanted to be clear. Thank you.

SENATOR COORDSEN PRESIDING

SENATOR COORDSEN: Senator Raikes, please.

SENATOR RAIKES: Thank you, Mr. President, members. Senator Bohlke, if I could ask you another question. This would lower the...or potentially lower the percentage share then that a school would get of special ed funds, is that right?

SENATOR BOHLKE: Just one second.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Question, Senator Bohlke.

SENATOR BOHLKE: Legal counsel is saying no, but let me ask one second, Senator Raikes, off the mike.

SENATOR RAIKES: Okay.

SENATOR BOHLKE: Senator Raikes, it does not, because this is lottery funds. Now what it could lower, as you expand the numbers, the amount of money when you would...you know that could be available, it could lower the lottery grant...the lottery fund that you may get, because you could be expanding the numbers.

SENATOR RAIKES: So it would...it would lower the money remaining in the lottery fund to be used for other education purposes, for example, the quality education, is that...is
