SENATOR SMITH: Madam President, I move the advancement of LB 960 to E & R for engrossing.

SENATOR CROSBY: You've heard the motion to advance LB 960 to E & R for engrossing. All in favor say aye. Opposed no. The bill advances.

CLERK: Senator Smith, on LB 1317, I have Enrollment and Review amendments, Senator. (AM7212, Legislative Journal page 912.)

SENATOR CROSBY: Senator Smith.

SENATOR SMITH: Madam President, I move the adoption of E & R amendments to LB 1317.

SENATOR CROSBY: You've heard the motion to adopt the E & R amendments to LB 1317. All in favor say aye. Opposed no. They are adopted.

CLERK: Senator Beutler would move to amend. (AM2757, Legislative Journal page 1007.)

SENATOR CROSBY: Senator Beutler, to open on your amendment.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Crosby, members of the Legislature, this is an amendment that seeks to expand the right to privacy that this bill provides. You may recall this is a bill that provides a measure of privacy when, with respect to the dissemination of information by either private or public entities, information that's accumulated by the Department of Motor Vehicles. Looking at the bill there is a prohibition, except in certain instances, against private parties disseminating sensitive information that may be used for bulk distribution of surveys, marketing and exhibitions. And then...but then, when you come over to the government sector side, not the private but the government sector side, there's a provision that says that federal and state and local political subdivision can use this sensitive information for...for any purpose of their agency without regard to whether it's sensitive or not. And so what this amendment does is to extend to the public entity area the same protection that a person gets in the
