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restrictive than what the federal parameters would require. So, could you give me maybe just an example of what...what it is that you think might be tried to be...to be done that we're trying to stop here, just to put this into practical perspective.

SENATOR CROSBY: Senator Beutler,...

SENATOR BEUTLER: That's...

SENATOR CROSBY: ...will you yield?

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...that's a good way to do it, Senator. I'm not sure I have an excellent example, but what...what concerned me is that the exception included federal, state and governmental agencies, local governmental agencies, so it seemed to me that there are an awful broad variety of local governmental agencies out there that might be interested in doing a survey, for example, or might be interested in marketing something. Is a utility a local governmental agency, for example? They have an interest in marketing and that sort of thing.

SENATOR BROMM: It would be...

SENATOR BEUTLER: It just seemed to me that, as a...as a precaution that in case there were government entities that were interested in these sorts of activities that they shouldn't have any more access to sensitive information than a private person.

SENATOR BROMM: Well,...and I...the...if they did do something it would have to be part of carrying out the agency's functions. I don't think...

SENATOR BEUTLER: Um-hum.

SENATOR BROMM: ...that a governmental agency ought to use this for marketing, that's for sure, but I'm...and I'm sort of thinking while I'm talking. I do know that, for example, in economic development or in housing grants, application for housing grants, at least if I remember right, some of the requirements in our local communities have required that you
