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resolve the problem in South Sioux City? Is that what this group is supposed to be, a trouble-shooting group of people who are going around with their 18-member commission and settling these problems and couldn't solve it in four years but if you give them another year they're going to take care of all of it? Members of the Legislature, I don't see one single project or goal listed on this sheet that Senator Smith handed around which could not have been taken care of in far less time than four years. But if you give these kind of groups a lot of time and you give an amount of money to make available some salaries then all of that time is going to be consumed. Then, if there remains money but no time, they're going to ask for time so that they can spend the money. They don't need any more time to finish this kind of activity that they have laid out on this piece of paper. If the body wants to follow the suggestion of Senator Coordsen, or at least he was stating what his intent is, then the amendment of Senator Wickersham's would be adopted to cut by six months the proposal under Senator Smith's proposal. But I'd like to ask Senator Schimek a question.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Senator Schimek.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Schimek, I don't know whether you have, but I've seen an editorial or two in support of what your bill is doing. Have you seen any such editorials?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: I did.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And wasn't it because some commissions and boards and these other things that nobody even knew what to call were being eliminated?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes, sir.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Do you think it would take editors very long to say they present a bill which is supposed to do one thing then, by the time it's over, they may have created another bureaucracy or extended the life of another one so, once again, the Legislature tells us it's going to do one thing but it lacks the will and resolve to carry through on it?
