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SENATOR SCHIMEK: That...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Do you think there might be an editorial along those lines?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: That would be a very good likelihood, I think.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And, Senator Schimek, if such an editorial were to be written, wouldn't it be better if we had to go through that to have it written over some commission whose work might better be justified than one like what we're discussing here?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: I don't know if I want to answer that directly, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, you don't have to. it was a loaded question.

SENATOR JANSSEN: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. Let me just make some comments then. I have not opposed the bill, but I don't think this proposal that Senator Smith is offering is of sufficient weight and merit to change the perception of what this bill is designed to do or what the Legislature's intention is. Are there going to be pet commissions that will be spared? What about those that are not to be spared because they didn't have a lobbyist and a paid person to come and tell the Legislature let us live a little longer? So you favor those who can lobby the Legislature, who can find somebody to speak for them, and the decision is not made on the basis of the principle embodied in the bill but, rather, the one who was able to get a lobbying presence to make us change our mind. I'm not...

SENATOR JANSSEN: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...prepared to do it.
