SENATOR TYSON: Okay.

SENATOR HILGERT: ...or debate it.

SENATOR TYSON: Senator Hilgert, you do not have a copy of this?

SENATOR HILGERT: I just received one a short time ago.

SENATOR TYSON: Well, that...okay, you're probably on the same time frame that I am then.

SENATOR HILGERT: Yeah.

SENATOR TYSON: I thank you very much, Senator Hilgert.

SENATOR HILGERT: You bet.

SENATOR TYSON: I would, for the purposes of information to the body, I'm going to read a...the third paragraph of this letter. Supreme Court has held matters proposed by this new legislation to be outside the jurisdiction...the commission's jurisdiction. Department of Roads Employees' Association v. Department of Roads....

SENATOR JANSSEN: One minute.

SENATOR TYSON: ...which is a 1973 case...pardon?

SENATOR JANSSEN: One minute, Senator.

SENATOR TYSON: A uniquely personal termination of office does not constitute an industrial dispute. They go on, in deference to the time. University Police Officers Association, authority granted to CIR is limited in nature, and Transport Workers of America v. Transit Authority of City of Omaha, the CIR has no jurisdiction to hear breach of contract cases. Now I don't purport to understand all of the nuances of this, but I do have to point out that late arriving amendments sometimes are not given the consideration that they should have, especially when they go into a politically charged area such as the CIR and, because of that, if there is no amendment...if there's no deletion of Senator Hilgert's...
