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support Senator Raikes'...well, his will make it better, because instead of there being 45 percent, it raises the bar to 47 percent, and by doing that reduces the amount that the state may ultimately be responsible for, so I'm going to support his amendment, but I'm still not going to support the bill.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Members, while the Legislature is in session and capable of transacting business, I propose to sign and do sign LB 74, LB 692 and LB 1258. Further discussion on the Raikes amendment to LB 1107? Senator Kremer, followed by Senator Tyson.

SENATOR KREMER: Thank you, Mr. President. Members of the Legislature, I keep hearing tax break all the time. I don't think it's a big tax break. What we've seen is property tax completely out of balance and paying much more than its share. It's to draw it in line where it should be. I'd like to ask Senator Raikes a couple questions.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Raikes, would you yield?

SENATOR RAIKES: Yes.

SENATOR KREMER: Your last column on your handout, where it changes it to 47 percent, that's the dollar increase that would be carried by sales and income tax and...is that correct?

SENATOR RAIKES: Okay, the far right one deals with a 46 percent cap.

SENATOR KREMER: We...oh...

SENATOR RAIKES: The 47 percent would be the third one from the right.

SENATOR KREMER: Okay, I'm...that's the new one, I'm looking at the one that you handed out last...okay. I was looking at the one you handed out last week. Yeah, the 46 percent, the third one in, that is the dollar increase by sales and income tax. Is that correct?

SENATOR RAIKES: Yes.
