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county. And I also feel the struggle that the rural area is having with the property taxes. Maybe this would help. You would have one district in every county, and those people that say that the little schools are going to ruin the communities, I don't...I don't buy that. If you lose your school, that's happened in my district. It's happened to a couple of towns, small towns. They haven't died. As a matter of fact, I think they are more viable right now than they were when they had their schools. If you have...if you have to survive because of the school being there, in my opinion you have a pretty weak community. You have to diversify. You have to offer people a reason to come to your town to shop, to eat. I don't see anything wrong with that. I don't see anything wrong with having one school system per county, and I'm talking Douglas County, Lancaster County, Hall County, Dodge County, whatever the county is. And I believe that Cherry County has one school district. If I'm wrong, Senator Jones, I...Senator Jones, can I ask you a question?

SENATOR JONES: Yes.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Senator Jones, does Cherry County have one school district?

SENATOR JONES: It's got a Class VI system out of Cherry County and then it's got Cody-Kilgore, Class III, that's west of Valentine.

SENATOR JANSSEN: All right, so you're pretty close right now, aren't you, to having...

SENATOR JONES: Yeah, and (interruption)...

SENATOR JANSSEN: ...one system in Cherry County.

SENATOR JONES: ...part of Cherry County that goes into Class VI systems in Grant, Thedford and towns around it, too.

SENATOR JANSSEN: But you have one, you have actually only two systems...

SENATOR JONES: Um-hmm, in that whole county.
