that's coming up. I cannot support the bill and there are other bills that I'm not going to be able to support however long we have to discuss them. This one, in fairness to what Senator Raikes has done, is not going to put any sitting member in a lot of trouble because there will be no effect from it and the public, if there is an awareness, will not really understand what it is that we've done. As Abraham Lincoln said at one point, the world will little note nor long remember what we say here. But a certain part of that world is going to be aware of the impact of this when the cows come home to roost, I mean the chickens come home to roost.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Suttle on the advancement of LB 1107.

SENATOR SUTTLE: Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Legislature. I am still struggling with this, with this issue. Constituents tell me to lower property taxes and cut spending. You can't do both with this bill I don't believe. We might be able to cut property taxes, or at least keep them steady, but we will increase spending. So what's the best way to do a lot of the things we want to do and a lot of the things we must do. I worry that we are shifting the tax from property taxes to income and sales, and at some point, income and sales taxes are going to run out. I think in the budget this year, we're already having troubles with where we want to spend our money and how much. So I don't know whether I vote for this and the people in my district will see a decrease in their property taxes but they'll see an increase in state spending, so this is a very difficult decision for me, at least, because I'm trying to please my constituents and I don't think I can do it on this bill. Somebody will not be satisfied with increased spending and somebody will not be satisfied if their property taxes go up, and their property taxes will go up, no matter what we do. Valuation goes up, therefore property taxes go up. So it's...it's very difficult for me to make that...this kind of a decision and I would really like to hear from Senator Wickersham again and tell me why this is...why this is a good thing for urban schools and urban districts. Thank you, Mr. President.
