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I'm not talking about an explanation that points fingers and blames somebody. I don't think that's going to be helpful and, in fact, there might not be anybody to blame and if there is any blame it might be us. I don't care but I think that we're entitled to a discussion about what happened and why we're confronted with what has been characterized as an unprecedented level of deficits. Maybe the Appropriations Committee has heard that discussion, but I think the rest of us need to hear it as well. The other point that I would make specifically with regard to the bill that we're discussing now, all of a sudden we're going to spend a couple of hours this afternoon discussing whether or not to add \$30 million to community college funding in an effort to mitigate property tax increases. Well, guess why we're having that discussion. Does anybody recall Senator Wehrbein's opening statement, and do you know why we're having that discussion? We're having that discussion because state aid to K-12 schools dropped by \$29 million and, if you press people to explain why state aid to K-12 schools dropped \$29 million it will be largely due to valuation increases. Is there any resonance? Do you understand why I thought and still do think that LB 1107 is an important bill and why it was represented good policy for us? If something like that had been in place we wouldn't be talking about \$29 million in reduced aid for K-12 schools that we have to transfer to community colleges in order to hold down property taxes. We would have held down property taxes in the first place and we would not be having this discussion, at least I don't think we'd be having that...this discussion at this magnitude. Now maybe you want to have these discussions every year, I don't know, but it doesn't seem to me that this is going to be the best use of our time. If we're going to commit dollars to property tax relief we ought simply to do that and go about our business. I was extremely pleased last year that the package that we passed did keep down property taxes, and if the Governor wants to claim credit for that the Governor can claim credit for that. If we want to claim credit for that I think we can claim credit for that. In fact, I think there's more than enough credit for everybody to go around. What we did worked. I think we ought to be focused on keeping on the path that works because it won't be very long and we'll again hear from our constituents, as Senator Crosby was suggesting, that property tax is the tax that's most on their mind and the tax that they want to see reduced the most. That
