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takeover of those additional assessor's offices and where we're headed. It doesn't always get a lot of play. It was something we did with levy limits. And I know that the counties are out there looking at that. That has the potential to be a huge grower. The second part is the Centennial Mall, as I understand it we own some of the property here in front of the Capitol?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: This is mostly down the mall, going north, in front of the State Office Building.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Okay. And the purpose for this is the whole renovation of that space from the Capitol to the university,...

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: That's right.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: ...basically, it's in poor condition, it needs to be repaired. The issue is, who ought to contribute what?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: And I'd suggest at some point in time what happens if the state, we just take over that whole strip of property and run it ourselves. Is that a more cost-effective thing for us to do than to have three different entities owning it?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: We didn't investigate that. There is private property along there as well as the city of Lincoln, public property, so we didn't get into that. And the police memorial is going to be in that area.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Okay. But that...how much of that, roughly, does the city of Lincoln have?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I don't know. The state is 57 percent, somebody has 9, and somebody has, I think, 9 percent private, so the difference would be, what, 20, 20-something percent?

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Okay. It's a long-term issue...
