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And we had two choices. We had the choice of looking at this Wilderness Camp Brown School program, or looking to Kearney or looking to replace facilities at Kearney. Now if we didn't do what we are talking about doing, it would cost us approximately \$11 million to replace physical plant at Kearney. And, in addition to that, it would cost another \$4 million to operate the camp in...at...I mean, to operate the facilities at Kearney. So we're talking a substantial number, about \$15 million, right off the bat, to operate a 150-bed facility. We can, with this Brown School Wilderness Camp program, we can reduce the...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: ...population at Kearney by about the same amount, between 150 and 200 boys, and we can lengthen the stay at Kearney Youth Training School. And what happens is that the young people that are violators would come into Kearney. They would be evaluated as to seeing whether or not they would go to the Wilderness Camp, or whether they would stay in Kearney, depending upon their propensities. But I think the big thing that impressed us and why we finally went with this Wilderness Camp on review was the fact that there is an aftercare program that goes with this. And that's the biggest thing that's wrong with any kind of correctional facility is that there is no aftercare program, or at least not an effective aftercare program. So what this amounts to in the Wilderness Camp is that they will be there approximately 90 days. And they can do 50 of them at a time, and they're for nonviolent, first time offenders, primarily. And the...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Time.

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Pederson. Senator Beutler, on the committee amendments to LB 1217.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Waive.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Beutler waives. Senator Dwite Pedersen, on the committee amendments. Senator Dwite Pedersen waives. Senator Wehrbein, on the committee amendments.
