elements in this budget. Nobody still has been able to satisfy me that that Wilderness Camp is anything other than a boondoggle and that it should not be. I'm sure there are going to be provisions in this budget that others may have a problem with, this deficit appropriation bill. There are going to be some things in the mainline budget. I know when we get to the university I've got to do something about them. Rather than hire one person they said we'll give up \$3,500,000, and I'm willing to take it, but I'm not willing to give it to that Wilderness boondoggle. Conservative "Repelicans" are driving what we're talking about. They're the ones who've taken over this session. They're the ones who want to manipulate the market on ethanol. They're the ones who want to engineer all kind of giveaway programs to the ag sector. They're the ones who will overlook a multimillion dollar assessment as a fine or a sanction when millions of dollars have been thrown at a program which does not work and probably never will work. They are the radicals. Radicals, that's what they are, based on their supposed philosophy. Larry Bare, instead of running around here hollering at senators, ought to be over there trying to tell the Governor, look, man, your...your administration is in the shambles; your administrators don't pay attention to you. I've got a letter that a person, who is not one of my constituents, had written to the Governor about finding out about some smoking rules and regulations for the State Patrol. Do you know the Governor's Office requested information from Colonel...the Sergeant, Nesbitt? And Nesbitt ignored it. He didn't give the information. So somebody wrote a pleading letter to Nesbitt, please give us the information. Well, he knows the Governor is weak so he ignored it too, and the person sent it to me and the letter said somebody higher than the Governor has to help me get this information and he sent it to me, and I'm going to contact the Colonel and tell him he may not have any respect for the Governor but his money comes through here. And it shouldn't even come to that. But if the Governor's own appointees have no respect for him you know they can run him around the stump. He doesn't know about state government. He's still a mayor and he's still running for the governorship. So we're having a long discussion today about these issues.
