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SENATOR WEHRBEIN: That's right. It has to be reappropriated. Now it shows up on the status. I don't want to mislead you...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Right.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: ...but what you said is true.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, thank you. Members of the Legislature, this bill will take one-tenth of the money available for A bills, one-tenth. There are several bills that carry A bills and they might total more than what would be left. Maybe they won't because perhaps the underlying bills will not pass, or the underlying bill may pass and the A bill may not. But that's not my primary reason for objecting to the bill. I think it is one of those kind of bills which would be described in the way, when I was a youngster playing horseshoes, we would characterize the way some people pitched the horseshoe. It was a luck, hope, pray pitch. That's what this bill is attempting, a luck, hope, pray strategy. There is nothing in it that is substantive or solid from the way that I view the bill from having read it. It is to make some money available without anybody knowing for sure where the money is going to go, what it's intended to do. The only thing we know for sure is that there is a maximum on these grants, the grants are for one year, but they can be renewed annually. Those kind of things we know for sure from the bill on how the giveaways are to occur and this is a giveaway bill. I know people don't like to hear that but that's precisely what it is. We're taking a million dollars and giving it to people who have not been successful in earning a living at what they do. We're giving it to them. We're saying that if a...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...group can come together and come up with a plan that would be accepted, and these plans I'm sure would be accepted whatever they are, they'll get this money, and I do not think that the way this bill is crafted it ought to be enacted. Somebody had stated earlier that there are going to be amendments to the bill, so I will listen to those amendments before I attempt to offer any of my own. Thank you, Mr. President.
