Redfield, on the Chambers amendment.

SENATOR REDFIELD: Thank you, Mr. Lieutenant Governor, members of the body. I think that everyone in this room is probably sharing the same intent, that we would like to see the economy throughout the entire state be successful. We want to see prosperity throughout the entire state, but I am looking at the bill, I'm not thoroughly convinced that the methods that we have purported here are actually going to be the best solution to that problem. I know that I'm a strong proponent of the Governor's plan to send monies back into the rural areas, but the plans that we have been looking at for businesses in the past, whether in the urban areas or in the rural areas right now, are looking at concrete investments of dollars in capital construction, also actual jobs that have been provided. I have never particularly been a fan of grant programs. I recognize that many times people have a tendency to look at that as money from heaven. It's not money that they handle quite the same way that they would if it was money that they were accountable to the taxpayer for. There doesn't seem to be the recognition that, in fact, those grant funds did come from the taxpayers somewhere somehow. And so as I'm looking at this, I'm trying to figure out what kind of investment we're looking at from the organizations that would receive these grants, and I see on the committee amendment, which I know that we're not discussing here, but in trying to understand Senator Chambers' amendment to it, I'm trying to look at the qualifying funds that these organizations would have to come up with. And on page 2 of the committee amendment, it talks about a...document a matching amount in money or in-kind contributions, on page 9 or line 9 of page 2. And my question is this, would these matching funds be with the Chambers amendment, with the committee amendment, if it follows through and we pass it, be possible to be provided only in an in-kind manner where a city or a community might say, hey, you can use my barn, you can use my city hall, you can use this meeting room here, and we'll call that in-kind contribution because it's space we didn't have to rent? We might use some people's volunteer services in a clerical capacity. We may distribute things through our regular newsletters. We're looking at a list of organizations here on this orange sheet which we know already have newsletters that they send out. These already exist. These are methods whereby these
