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would be a very effective thing if done in conjunction with other states, Minnesota, all the Midwestern states. We can do that notwithstanding the negatives on that kind of a bill. I think we should do it because I think that can have the second, that would be the kind of thing that would have the second largest positive effect on the countryside. Creating new economic opportunities and new jobs, I guess, I think that's the third thing, and I think that's where this bill falls, and so since it seems to be the best of alternatives in a tough situation out there, I want to be supportive. I think things like this, if done right and done well and a little money put into it, would be even more productive for the rural areas than property tax...property tax reduction. Having said that, then let me address my first amendment. The bill, in a structural sense, keys on a definition of farming and ranching. Then as you read through the bill, it talks about farms and ranches, and then it talks about ranchers and farmers without a relationship back to the idea of farming and ranching, although I think that relationship is...is intended. So all this amendment does is to relate all of those different words. It restructures the basic definition to change farming and ranching to farming and ranching operations, and then picks up that definition and be sure it's...and sees that it's consistent throughout the bill. So I think when you see this in an E & R amendment then that you will think that it reads a lot better, and I think that's probably important to Senator Wehrbein in the sense that many of these initiatives, although not all, are encouraging the assistance to people who are actually involved in ranching and farming as opposed to other economic interest groups in the communities. I mean this bill, as I..as I read it, Senator Wehrbein, and this probably should be discussed a little bit, is in thought and in apparent intent designed primarily to work with producer groups on new ways of dealing with the agricultural sector, as opposed to although not necessarily excluding enterprises that are completely unrelated to the agricultural sector as those enterprises may be thought of or created or carried out in the rural areas. So for purposes of clarifying that whole...that whole discussion and the whole intent of the bill, whether it's for ag sector or for ag sector and other rural types of economic development or interests, whichever is intended, at least this clarification of the definitions will make clear in Section 4 what is being exactly
