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of thing, and because we in the committee, having had toured as long as...as far...and also others had toured Geneva over the last two or three years and felt that the conditions there really needed improvement, so we decided to keep those funds committed to Geneva in this case. But there is another \$970,000 that needs to be committed to that into the future. Now that actually goes on the years...the budget we will work on next year. If...by doing this today, that will have to be reappropriated, reaffirmed actually, is what we do, in the Building Program, this \$970,000. It will show up on this second year, the one we're coming up on, July as \$2.2 million; \$970,000 will be in the future to be reaffirmed as part of the Building Program. It's something that could be done later, but the dilemma is if we are serious about doing the \$2.2 million Building Program this year, this coming year, then they need to have assurance that at least, up until the reappropriation or the reaffirmation, that we will continue to finish the project at the level that's estimated right now, which is approximately \$3.1 million. So to keep faith with the intent of what I think the body thus far has demonstrated the desire to do, I think that we should go ahead and commit this. The Building Fund is really no different than any other appropriation, because it has to be reaffirmed. But it does signal our intent to follow through on a Building Program. If you want similarities, it's much like the prison at Tecumseh. We reaffirmed the continued support of the funding for that over...I think that was over four years. And so this really recognizes that that cost will be there, once again, if that's what the body determines to do. Our committee decided that Geneva was more important than building a new parole revocation. I would say also in the bigger picture here there's a lot of frustration, I realize, in spending money in this area. And I don't think any of you have any more frustration than we do on the committee. But if I may philosophize a bit, you know we are a reflection of the problems of society. And no one asked to have more of these inmates, if you will, or juveniles in these facilities, but they keep coming and they keep coming. And the justice system needs a place to put them, if there's no other alternatives. We're going to get into this in the wilderness camp, as I understand, here later. The answer is to stop these things happening, and I don't know that any of us has those answers. But once again, I repeat to the point of being too repetitive, one of my frustrations, the
