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SENATOR THOMPSON: Thank you. This session I introduced a bill that was a full Facility Master Plan implementation. The committee...it's still in the Appropriations Committee. This was part of that bill for this year's budget. I will bring it back next year with...because we need to move on to issues not only at Geneva but at Kearney. The administration took some of the money that was appropriated last year to begin the process of putting automatic door release locks and I'm not certain but I can find out fairly quickly what the status of that is. They have done some other things, particularly in the Dunbar facility, to...dealing with plumbing that was hanging out that was a worry for kids particularly who might be suicidal to have this piping in the rooms that are locked down, and that has been removed and rerouted. So some work has begun. To me, that's just taking care of things maybe more as a Band-Aid approach but it's good that we're addressing some of those life safety issues. The Facility Master Plan has what I feel are some very, very serious points that they make about safety and fire issues and I'd be happy to just copy those and pass those pages around. We have to begin the process. Our buildings are being exempt by the fire marshal, is what the report says. I agree with you that these are very, very serious issues. This will address the start here. The Dunbar facility at Geneva, some of the girls, if my understanding of the multipurpose facility is correct, unless they manage it a different way, some of those girls will be in the ten-bed unit that will be part of the multipurpose building. There will still be girls in that building. It is recommended that that building be torn down and replaced but it wasn't recommended for year one. I think we have work to do on issues regarding the institutionalization of girls in our state and I have another bill and I...Senator Chambers reminds me of how many bills I'm throwing out all the time, but my priority bill is going to deal with some of those intake screening issues, and I hope maybe we can cut some of the numbers. But to answer your question, this is just the first step that was recommended in the first part of the plan. We have not committed to the whole plan. And I'd be happy to yield some time back to you because I know I gave a very long answer.

SENATOR REDFIELD: That's fine, Senator Thompson. I know that you're far more familiar than any of us with the details up
