utilizes the fundamental approaches of a therapeutic Wilderness Camp, therapeutic boarding school, and traditional adventure-based intervention. It's based on sound and appropriate use of reality therapy, positive social culture, adventure therapy, behavior shaping, intervention, and classical group therapy. It address...the model addresses the National Juvenile Justice Initiative and restorative justice, or the balanced approach. The program attempts to involve the whole family under a family systems model of treatment and intervention. The aftercare and transition program continues for six to nine months in their aftercare placement through structured homework packets, which includes visitations, telephone contacts and return visits to the residential program. Families are encouraged to participate in continued services. Aftercare placements include youth homes, youth foster care, structured group homes, or therapeutic group homes or other, wherever it's most appropriate. And I will say one of the things that I used, in a nutshell, looks like to is a holistic approach to taking care of juveniles; that they learn quite a bit about Mother Nature and I believe that's some of the reason for the name of Wilderness Camp, is because they realize you touch a hot stove, it's hot, that type of thing. That's very simplistic. Perhaps I shouldn't use...that was my example, but it's the idea that there is a reaction for every action. Some of these kids have not been off concrete, so to speak. It's an attempt to have it in a nature setting where they can experience the frost...or the dew on the ground, if you will, those kinds of basic experiences which they have found in many cases kids have come to totally be in awe of and appreciate, not recognizing the real world. When we went through the explanation, I thought to myself it's something that I have taken for granted growing up on a farm but you don't really get these experiences in the city where many of these come from.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.
