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men who make license plates are not going to get a job outside the penitentiary making license plates. So people talk about this stuff who have no concept whatsoever of the reality that the people affected by it are going to be confronted, and if we bring a plan, it's not listened to and not accepted. I can bring things to this Legislature and they're rejected. So you have some white people who are going to say that if we teach a child where not to touch a horse, where not to touch a cow without getting kicked. See, what black people will tell our children, don't touch that animal, don't touch that animal, don't go putting your hands on strange dogs. That's how we do it. We don't say if this dog looks a certain way, take a chance, but if you touch him, don't touch him there because he might bite you. We tell them that, just like all guns are loaded, all dogs have teeth and all dogs will bite. You all don't know how we deal with our children, but you have that old plantation mentality that if you put them out there where they can pick some corn or pick some cotton or have some white man telling them do this, do that...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...and do the other because I'm smarter than you, I used to own your people and we, by God, are going to tell you what's good for you and we'll put you out there in the wilderness because you don't belong on the sidewalk. That's what turns you into a criminal. But white people are on sidewalks. White people built the sidewalks. We are not slaves. We are not your property, and I am burned up and I'm going to fight from this point on for what I think is in the best interest of my children who are going to wind up out there on the plantation. They can go to the plantation in "Broken Bone" because I wasn't hardhearted enough to stop that, but I'm going to do what I can to stop this one and stop other things that you all want.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Bromm, on the amendment.

SENATOR BROMM: Thank you, Senator Cudaback. Last fall, when this project was being looked at, my understanding is that the Brown School was looking at a number of different locations
