juvenile programs when we moved it under the Office of Juvenile Services, but juvenile probation is not under the Office of Juvenile Services. It's still under the courts, where I believe it should be and should stay. So a "nontime"...first-time non...first-time nonviolent offender, excuse me, is a term that we're using here that's thrown around loosely. Some of these people have been on probation two, three times and then they're sent to Kearney. We're talking about the juvenile court system, we're not talking about the adult court system. But I'm wondering if we're building an institution called the Work Ethic Camp at a cost of \$6.5 million for first-time offenders, nonviolent offenders, and now we're building a juvenile facility, where...where are we going to get all of these first-time offenders? Now, I understand the juvenile system that we will be sending some of them to Kearney that are going now that could probably go to this facility. I hear what Senator Chambers said and some of the concerns that he has I, too, have. What the young people need is a continuum of care, not more hoops to jump through. Now if this is a program that is going to have a good aftercare program and long term, then it's a program I could support. I'm not so sure that this program has that. The biggest thing these people suffer from is the withdrawal of affection, and when you go to one institution and another institution and another probation officer and another person and they move on and that affection changes every time, pretty soon they get callous. They need people who are going to stick with them and work through them, work through the problems with them. They need to bring the families in, which I understand the aftercare program is going to do, but we need families involved from the very first. We haven't put money into...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR Dw. PEDERSEN: ...that, people. We haven't given...given money to the Probation Department to do more family treatment and more family counseling. We have some private organizations that are doing as best they can with as little bit of funds as they have. We have to look at a thorough program from the beginning to end and not continue to put out fires. They need somebody who's going to stick with them and somebody they know that's going to be there in thick and thin,
