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not somebody who is going to trail 'em, nail 'em, and jail 'em and then forget 'em. Do we need that part of it? Yes, but we need that continuum. We need to get in front of that before that happens and we need the whole system put together. I'm so afraid that we're going to throw money after money after money and we're still not doing what is really right and...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR Dw. PEDERSEN: ...that's starting from the beginning and follow through to the end. Very easy to lock 'em up and forget about 'em, very easy, and this withdrawal of affection that they feel when they're moving on from one person to the other, there's some very...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time, Senator Pedersen.

SENATOR Dw. PEDERSEN: ...good people in these programs and that's what happens. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Pedersen. (Visitors introduced.) Next senators wishing to speak are Senator Preister, Chambers, and Senator Landis. Senator Preister, on the Chambers amendment, AM2819.

SENATOR PREISTER: Thank you, Honorable President, members of the body. Senator Cudaback, I'm glad you know who's in your district and appreciate your comments. I appreciate Senator Pedersen's comments because I think he's right on point. Having worked in what was then the Boys Club, is now Boys and Girls Club, for ten years, he's absolutely right that what young people need is caring adult relationships to help guide them. That can be done in a host of settings. Preferably, it happens in their lives as they're growing up so they don't become institutionalized, so they don't have to be treated in programs. Programs like Kearney are really set up to deal, because society has failed and we have not done enough to help these young people. I don't know that the Brown School is necessarily a good or a bad program. I have heard some recidivism rate of maybe 1 percent; that 99 percent of the young people succeed. I don't know if Senator Pederson or Senator Wehrbein or anybody could perhaps tell me, I'll start with Senator Pederson,
