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get this kind of...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: ...information it would have to come from the people that were in charge of the program, but I would have no reason to doubt these results. These are not court-setting situations. These are...these are just based upon...upon the camp itself and who has returned to be incarcerated after...after being released from them.

SENATOR PREISTER: Senator Pederson, if I could also ask you, apparently after an initial evaluation, in this case it would be at Kearney, then there is the 3 months or the 90 days in the camp, and following that there's a period of ongoing counseling and intervention. That takes place where?

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: That can take place in a number of settings and what they do, it's my understanding that all of the people who are potentially going to go into this Wilderness Camp would first go to Kearney...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: ...where they would be assessed. Sorry.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Preister. Senator Chambers, and this will be your third time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I'd like to ask Senator Don Pederson a few questions.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Pederson, would you yield to a question?

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: Yes, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Pederson, how long has this Brown School been in operation?
