of record that produces incarceration can be a whole process of these kinds of things, drip by drip, in which the system ultimately gets a disproportionate reflection of the population and that once a kid is in jail, if it's actually jail, there is no real rehabilitation there, and when you do come out it stigmatizes you in a way that leads you to a downward spiral. So that if you build capacity, if you build new beds, that capacity is likely to be filled with a disproportionate number of black people as a result of limited economic options in the black community and, secondly, in the implicit racism in the operation of a law enforcement system across this spectrum, whether it's kids and cops, kids and prosecutors, kids and judges, kids and probation officers or whatever. And I'm wondering if that's a fair characterization of why, over time, you generally resist expanding capacity on the law enforcement field. I'm going to give you about a minute. I'll hope you give me a couple minutes back because I want to make a comment as well.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Would you yield, Senator Chambers?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And it won't take a minute, Mr. President. Thank you, Senator Landis. The answer to that question is yes, and most recently white people are becoming aware of this concept, not just of driving while black but breathing while black. Latinos and other dark-skinned people are targeted by the Nebraska State Patrol to be stopped on the interstate, so what you have said can be documented from any number of sources.

SENATOR LANDIS: Okay, thank you, because I want to understand the nature of the objection here, because I think there are two or three things. Number one, we don't spend real money on rehabilitation. That's a problem. Number two, we don't do as much as we could outside the law enforcement field on education and jobs. Senator Chambers, I want to tell you I'm also concerned about capacity. I want that capacity to be as appropriate, I want it to be as fair, I want it to be as "rehabilitatively" oriented as possible, but I do want...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR LANDIS: ...a sufficient amount of capacity so that
