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something. When you get my age, Senator Chambers' age, Senator Pederson's age, we're kind of set in our ways, I don't know if we can change too much, but these young people you can. I have seen a VCR strip, I guess, of this Brown School and I guess I was impressed with it. I felt it gave an opportunity for these young people in their teenage years, whether they're black, white, Native American, Hispanic, whatever they are, I think it gives them an opportunity to work together in not a jail atmosphere but in more of a home lifestyle, being out in the wilderness, out in the fresh air, doing things together. You know, we talk about prejudice and things like that. Little children are not prejudiced. They don't care, they get along with everybody. As we get older then we start looking at maybe these prejudice things that drive us, I don't know. I have never felt that I was prejudiced. I don't believe that I am, at least I don't try to be. But I think this is an opportunity for some of our young people to have an opportunity to better themselves so they don't end up in a lock-up facility, in a correction facility. And I don't know that much about this Wilderness Camp. I have never attended them. I have not talked to anybody that's affiliated with them or anything like that, but I guess I'm probably going to support this, the funds for this. I'll probably have to vote against Senator Chambers' amendment here because I think it's a step in the right direction for our young people. And I guess I'm going to try and answer one of Senator Chambers' questions that he asked, how far it was from here to Fullerton and how far it is from Omaha to Fullerton, if that's where it may end up. Senator Robak advises me it's 137 miles from Omaha to Fullerton and 111 from Lincoln, and so I hope that answers the questions on that. And since I've made these comments I've been listening very intently to what's going on here. I know Senator Chambers has spoken three times on this, but I'm going to give the rest of my time to Senator Chambers, if he would like to have it to go ahead and discuss this some more. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers, about a minute and a half. Thank you, Senator Schmitt. Senator Preister.
