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SENATOR CHAMBERS: Did Brown tell you that what they mean by recidivism is if a child commits another offense and is sentenced again by a court? Is that what they said they meant, or you're presuming that's what they mean?

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: The report that I have is a summary of criminal activity and they showed what...what criminal activity that person had been charged with before and what the...what they had done following that in that same area, I assume.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: That's all I'll ask you, Senator Pederson. Thank you.

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: May I clear up one other thing that there was a ques...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: If you don't take too long, because it's on my time.

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: Okay. They have looked at Idaho. They were actually out in Idaho and looked at their program out there.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Who was?

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: Health and Human Services.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. I'm not impressed by much that Health and Human Services does because this is what they want. That...this is all they've looked at for the last two years, from what we were told, that's all, so they want to make it go. Idaho is where they have...well, I won't even go into all that, but that's hardly a hospitable environment for people who are not white in complexion, whether they're Native American, Latino, or African American. They always want to jump to some of these other things, but in this program there was no hearing where the public could be allowed to speak. I'd like to ask Senator Wehrbein a question, as Chairperson of that Appropriations Committee.
