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agree with Senator Chambers on is this was never a bill. This is something we came in and said we want, from the Health and Human Services, something that will work, and I know they put some time in on it, but I'm to the point where I don't think we put enough time in on it. When we have for-profit company out of Texas coming in to take care of our youth, that scares me. When I first came into the Legislature, a little over seven years ago, I thought that privatization might be a place where we could save some money and do some good things. As I've toured programs, private prisons and private companies across the country that have taken care of county jails and so forth, it's become more and more evident that they're into it for the dollar. And if that's what we want to do, is use our money so somebody else can have a profit, and then we lose what Senator Chambers was talking about, our control over the institution or facility that we privatize, too, in giving it to somebody else, then that worries me. And it really worries me when we're talking about our youth, our young people. We've got some community-based programs in the state of Nebraska that haven't even been brought into this situation, or questions...organizations that take care of kids that do a good job, and we're cutting their money. They're operating on less and less money every year and, yet, we're willing to jump up and spend this kind of money. This type of program, wilderness program, as I said is a program that I think has been proven and worked in the wilderness programs that I know of, and I'm talking about Outward Bound Program, which is the name of it, but I don't know that we're ready to jump right now into having a privatized company come in and take care of our youth. There's lots of questions to ask and I don't think we have the time to do it, and that's what's concerning me more and more as we talk into the day. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Pedersen. On your motion to bracket, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, had this been a bill other agencies and entities with Nebraska roots could have come in to testify. They could have been told the type of child who is envisioned as an inmate at one of these camps and maybe they already have programs that would address those needs. As Senator Pedersen pointed out, the description
