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date put in there. But I think it would be a relatively short period of time after a contract was entered into that they would be able to function. And incidentally, in that same regard, the information that I have is that there are about 1,000 admissions a year at the training school at Kearney; some of those are parole revocations, and there are actually about 600 to 700 new...new kids that are brought there every year, which is an average of about 50 to 60 a month.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, so 50 to 60 a month. In a three-month period that would be from 150 to 180 who are coming in.

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: That's correct.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: That camp would keep a child there for 90 days,...

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...a three month period. So, in the three months that those 50, let's put it at maximum capacity, the three months that those 50 are being processed, from 150 to 180 more are coming into Kearney.

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: And, on the contrary, others are going out, too, because they've served the requisite period of time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But you don't have...

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: So you've got them coming in and going out at the same time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But you don't have any figures to show us how fast they're going out, do you?

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: Well, I think that depends upon the individuals.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Not, I think, I'm just asking, do you have the figures at this point?

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: Not at this...not right with me.
