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any other senators who would like to see people serve on this task force, anything you can do to promote that in your districts, so that we have a large selection of names would be helpful and then I'll talk with Senator Coordsen because it goes to the Executive Board, if we make recommendations to them or how that may work.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Thank you, Senator Bohlke, and I can assure you that I will have a couple of names for you. Thank you very much.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Vrtiska. On the Bohlke amendment, Senator Thompson. Senator Wehrbein, on the Bohlke amendment.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes, very briefly, I'm going to talk on the main bill, Madam...Mr. President and members, but I did want to comment on this. I was a little concerned about the largeness of this committee also with four additional people. But I will say, I also consider this really a major task force as I look at it because I assume, I'll maybe talk a little about it later, but we talk about mandates, I mean where we have one on one in many cases across this state now, one teacher, one pupil because of the federal court rulings. I don't know whether we're going to be able to get into that, but it looks like to me as we broaden the demands on teachers that that could be part of our discussion, and I'll let you answer in a minute. But one of the reasons I'm really interested in this expansion is because I also will see if we're going to make major changes in the state, and I am I guess of the opinion now we've arrived in the teacher issue, in the teacher shortage, and the wide areas that are short, that we're actually going to have to make major, major decisions and education is going to be a major part. And I would presume that if we do this and add taxpayers that we're going to have to have enlightened taxpayers across the state to understand the broadness and the necessity of the scope of this study and bring them along because I often see our job here as to educate everyone of the seriousness of the problem because it isn't only the problem of the Legislature, ultimately it's the problem of all taxpayers in the state, not just the school boards, but those that pay the bills and that understand the necessity of good teachers.
