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they pressured you and they told you take this bill off, don't go through with it, don't accept the amendment. And Senator Jensen can speak for himself, but these things ought to be on the record and we ought to make sure what kind of commitment we got from the Governor's Office, which is not worth (snaps fingers) that. I've seen his so-called commitments. I've watched Larry Bare out there and I've seen them bully other workers in the Governor's Office and intimidate people on this floor, and I want every time they do it for it to come out just like it is. Senator Jensen could have told us at that meeting, no, we're not going to go for this. Senator Wehrbein...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...could have said, I don't like it, we're not going for it. Did you say time? Then I'd turn my light on again.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Yes, Senator. Thank you. Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Wehrbein, on the bracket motion.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Mr. Speaker, I really thought Senator Chambers was ahead of me again, but I only wanted to say that the real issue is whether it's in law or not at the 185 percent level and, frankly, that's what the Governor disagrees with putting in and it's much like the issue yesterday which was agreed to by this body to take out the Wilderness Camp and it takes 25 votes to put it back in. Takes 25 votes to take out 185; it's going to take 25 votes to put it back in. Takes 25 votes to take the Wilderness Camp out; it's out. Now we got to put 25 votes. So let's just be honest. It's politics at its...is it finest or worst? I don't know which it is. But that's the issue and we may well end up here next year doing 185 percent. That's the real issue at this point whether it's in law or not. There is the word, the Governor's Office, that will...what will happen, it will stay just like it's been for the last several months until the study is done, but it, at this point, would not be in law. If we do nothing, that's what exactly what it will be. We'll proceed with the status quo for another year or so and then go from there. The real question is, will 185 percent be in the law, which will have to be taken out if it was to be a change, which I do think most of us agree
