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it will be very difficult to change that. That's a fact of life. And I would guess that practically...probably most of us won't end up lowering the 185 percent level to some other number. So that is basically the issue as I see it. It is true that we had the discussion down there and it is true that we were pretty...pretty close to agreement on the potential. To the degree that this is a serious breach is, I guess, up to each one of us to decide.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Wehrbein. Senator Chambers, on the motion to bracket LB 1407.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. President, and I'm going to continue with my mentoring. Let me tell you the difference between this situation and the Wilderness Camp. I was not part of any agreement or deal with people on the Wilderness Camp where I gave the impression I'm in favor of it. What I'm talking about is where we all sat down together at a table as honorable people and talked, Senator Wehrbein, and that makes it entirely different. Yes, it's politics but, as you said, at its worst. Senator Terry Carpenter said politics is a dirty double-crossing racket and that's why I love it. That's what he said. He's right about the dirty double-crossing racket part. Senator Wehrbein, I did not mislead you with reference to the Wilderness Camp or anything I've ever talked to you about. I've never told you one thing and done something else. I've never sat down at a meeting with you and said, I agree to this, then turn around and change it into something else. So don't...these two things are not the same. I went after that Wilderness thing in a straightforward way. What Senator Jensen wanted to do was to just let LB 1407 go away and nobody knows anything about it, and I'm not going to go for that. And if you'd all don't like it I don't care, and I'm going to spare you something now. You don't need to worry about me working with you on anything anymore, any of you. And don't come to me asking. You think I like to take all that time rewriting this kind of stuff that staff members don't write very well? They're not my staff. I have one person working in my office and I'd venture to say I turn out more quality work than anybody on this floor. I have one person working for me, with me, and you don't see me having people standing next to me telling me what to say on this microphone either. What I do is my responsibility. It comes
