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SENATOR CHAMBERS: Here's what I want to understand from you. In...in terms of a time frame, if we leave it to the administration, when at the earliest are they administratively going to change the system from the way it is being administered now?

SENATOR JENSEN: Senator, they will not change anything administratively.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So if we do not bring a bill next year, then status quo will continue through next year and on and on until we legislatively make a change. Is that what the Governor's Office has told you?

SENATOR JENSEN: That is correct.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Then I'm going to rephrase it. Not only is it unnecessary for us to offer a bill this session, it's unnecessary for us to offer a bill next session to protect the current way the program is being administered. Is that correct?

SENATOR JENSEN: Senator, the only reason to change that would be if...if the cost becomes so burdensome that we're, I suppose, and that's part of the appropriations process, where there's other programs that might have to be cut or whatever it might be.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, that's not what I'm asking. I'm trying to figure out what we've got before us on the table here. Are you saying that if the Legislature does not take action to change the up to 185 percent and the rest of the things that are currently in the way the program is administered, if we don't enact any law that system will not be changed administratively?

SENATOR JENSEN: That is correct.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Is that what you're saying?

SENATOR JENSEN: That is correct.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And this is what the Governor gave you to
