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Class I sitting right in town and then there's a high school. If that Class I wanted to raise the mill levy, I wouldn't see where they'd have no problem; but if there's one 20 miles out, they would have a big problem.

SENATOR BOHLKE: Correct.

SENATOR JONES: Okay. Well, I'm going to continue to listen. Thank you.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Tyson.

SENATOR TYSON: Mister...thank you, Mr. President. I would have a question of Senator Bohlke.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Bohlke, would you respond?

SENATOR BOHLKE: Yes.

SENATOR TYSON: Senator Bohlke, why would someone who does not pay the tax bill of the Class I school get to dictate to the electors of the Class I district how much they should pay for their tax...school...for their school district?

SENATOR BOHLKE: Senator Tyson, if they're in the system they do pay.

SENATOR TYSON: Say...say again please.

SENATOR BOHLKE: If they are in the system, the taxpayer pays.

SENATOR TYSON: It was my understanding...

SENATOR BOHLKE: The "system" refers to everybody who pays a tax in the system.

SENATOR TYSON: But in a Class I school district, only the electors that reside within the Class I school district send their children to that school and incur the costs.

SENATOR BOHLKE: Not under the common levy. I'll send legal counsel over.
