but because we have a number of situations across the state now that are outside what I would characterize as the metropolitan counties where greenbelt could now be used. We're not really changing that. Greenbelt could be used, for example, in Dawes County, if they were zoned.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. So the answer to my...

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: So they may use it...

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...the answer to my question is, no, the changes in the laws are not going to, in and of themselves or by reason of the changes, effectuate a much greater use of greenbelt provisions.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Not that I'm aware of...

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: ...because we're basically keeping the same standards. It has to be ag land. It has to be zoned. It has to...can't be subdivided land. We're recapturing taxes with the same amount of interest. Now we are define...we are explicitly putting some things in statute that, in the past, have been in kind of gray areas. We're saying that when you get special use valuation then you get 80 percent of that as the value, but that's comparable to what we do for ag land now. You have market value and then at 80 percent of valuation.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Right.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: We're specifying that recapture value is 80 percent of the full market value, see, because recapture is calculated on market value as opposed to ag use value, so we're specifying that you keep the 80 percent relationship in that regard. We are also specifying that...

SENATOR BEUTLER: To that extent, it's a more appealing...

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Well,...

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...alternative.
