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SENATOR JANSSEN: No, I don't, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Has it been, do you think, over 20 years?

SENATOR JANSSEN: I have no idea...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh.

SENATOR JANSSEN: ...so I can't answer that.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Do you think that an increase is in order, an increase of some amount?

SENATOR JANSSEN: I wouldn't know, Senator Chambers, until we had a hearing on that, you know, a public hearing, to explain the reasons for raising them or even lowering them.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, I can tell you why I'm raising them, because they haven't been raised in a long time and they need to be raised. In fact, they should be raised to a prohibitory level, but I'm not doing that. Am I to take it from your answers that you're opposed to this amendment?

SENATOR JANSSEN: You are correct in that assumption, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, Senator Janssen, without having done research on the subject and not knowing anything about it, how can you know enough to be opposed to an amendment?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Well, because the fact that these people that are in this business right now, not all of them but some of them, it would be a burden on them to have their license in some cases tripled.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Janssen, what is the most heavily regulated industry in this society, if you have an opinion?

SENATOR JANSSEN: If I had an opinion, I would say it would be alcohol.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And do you feel that there has been adopted a
