SENATOR JANSSEN: That would be true.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So when they purchase these licenses, it's not a case of them just doing something that benefits the state. It's a situation where they are being given a privilege and this is the fee they have to pay in order to exercise that privilege which is denied to all others except those who hold similar licenses. Is that true?

SENATOR JANSSEN: It's not denied to everyone. If they want to apply for a license they can do so.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, I said denied to every other person not holding such a license.

SENATOR JANSSEN: That's correct.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. Now what is unreasonable about requiring a person who currently sells 100 barrels daily, that's the capacity, what's wrong with raising that license from \$100 to \$300? How is that going to burden that individual? It's a manufac...this one...okay, on the first page.

SENATOR JANSSEN: First page.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes. How is raising that from \$100 to \$300, when there hasn't been an increase in over 30 years?

SENATOR JANSSEN: That would just be another cost of doing business, Senator Chambers, and I think that that would not really be beneficial to that person who has the license and who has...also has employees and a payroll to meet.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So you think that...how often are these licenses renewed?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Yearly.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So an increase of \$200 in the licensing fee would cause this person to have to lay off employees and
