move forward, and other adjustments that may be necessary in the bill can be worked on and, if we deem such adjustments to be necessary, the bill can be pulled back. In most instances I would not agree to something like that. But let me ask Senator Bromm a question before my time runs out.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Bromm, would you yield?

SENATOR BROMM: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Bromm, did we have what amounts to an agreement that, if the bill is allowed to move forward this morning, unless there are other specific amendments that we're going to deal with, then if some of the areas that I would like to see worked on, in terms of how we establish the validity of judgments in other states to make sure that we're not just creating an ad hoc system, we could work those things and then bring the bill back to make further adjustments, if deemed necessary? Have we got that agreement?

SENATOR BROMM: Senator Chambers, we did discuss that, and I did...I did suggest that and agreed to that. I'll be honest with you, I've not had a chance to talk to Senator Engel about that issue at all,...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Don't worry about him. Do you...

SENATOR BROMM: ...because we've been involved in...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...agree?

SENATOR BROMM: Well, I agree, but...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: That's all I need.

SENATOR BROMM: ...but it's his...but it's his bill, and I...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, it's not, he already said he has turned it over to others who are smarter than he on this issue...
