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tobacco program, but it certainly is going to address a large share of it and certainly going to set a...jump-start that and get us going.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Well, actually, you mean \$7 million times 3 years, so it's \$20 million.

SENATOR JENSEN: That...that's right, \$21 million, it's \$21 million.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes, \$21 million. So, I think I can support that under this. I mean, I've been very protective and I know you have, too. I trust your intentions here and I have no problem with that, because I, too, thought maybe we ought to have a little more direct program toward tobacco cessation out of those settlement funds. I...so I'm comfortable with this and I'm willing to...and I...the other thing I think is significant, increasing that control group to...from five to eight...

SENATOR JENSEN: Nine.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: ...and...nine, oh...

SENATOR JENSEN: Nine.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: ...I thought I saw eight, okay. I will be supportive of the amendment.

SENATOR JENSEN: Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Wehrbein. Senator Lynch, on the Jensen amendment.

SENATOR LYNCH: On the bill.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: I didn't hear you, Senator.

SENATOR LYNCH: Oh, that's all right. Mr. Chairman and members, I only wanted to comment. I, first of all, support the amendment and the bill. And I wish there was this much loyalty and concern about buildings as well, that also is a problem for our state and how money is spent and where it comes from. But I
