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administrative commission. It will...it will undoubtedly operate much in the way that the one for hearing-impaired and deaf people do...does, and that one has been very successful. And they had a hard time getting started. I remember when it...when it was established. I remember some of the people who were involved and who are still involved in that commission for deaf people, who worked very hard to get the rules and regulations set up and look at that commission, what they have done for education across the state. We have interpreters working in some of the schools where we didn't ever have people like that before. We have interpreters at theater productions where we never had anyone like that before. So, I do compare this one to the one for hearing-impaired and deaf people because it's somewhat...it has the physical...something they're born with or that happens to them as they go through life, through an accident or something. So, think about those things and vote against the kill motion and then vote to move the bill. Thank you.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Kristensen, members of the Legislature, just real quickly, I...Senator Crosby said what I intended to say. I think it's absolutely essential to clear up what I think was a mis...Senator Wickersham misspoke. There's no five...half a million dollar A bill on this. The funds are being transferred from one agency to another, so there's no cost at all, except for the eight or six thousand...eight and six thousand dollars that was added to it by my amendment. So the decision is not a fiscal decision. The decision is basically which way you think the visually-impaired people can be most effective for the least money and generate the most enthusiasm and work for their cause, whether they can do it through a commission or as part of HHS. But it's not...it's not a matter of a fiscal decision I don't believe. Thank you.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Bromm.

SENATOR BROMM: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. And I really didn't want to speak on this bill. I...it brings back memories from when we went through this once before and then the bill was vetoed by Governor Nelson and Health and Human Services
