value-added agricultural sector, but it's the agricultural sector. Are other kinds of sectors going to want help from the state government when they start to do poorly? There are just, it seems to me, a large number of questions that ultimately maybe...may put kinds of pressure and is putting kinds of pressure on state government that will further remove us from our ability to do the kinds of things that state government should be about. I'm not sure that it should be about and into economic development to the extent that we're beginning to see. In any event, bringing it back all around to the current amendment, I'm simply suggesting that we make the sunset clear, and that in the meantime with respect to this bill and Senator Wehrbein's bill and LB 775, which has no income guidelines in it, I think that's subject to some serious review also, meanwhile look at all of these things together and try to come up with a coherent philosophy that works for everybody but doesn't result in the continual pressing of state government for ever greater incentives, first in one area, then in another,...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...first to protect us from outstate interests, then to protect us from ourselves, then to protect us from another industry, then to bolster a fourth industry. This, it seems to me, can be endless, an endless ratcheting of one industry versus another, one region of the state versus another. And we ought to think through what makes sense in all of this. And I really don't want to bring up that question...I didn't...I don't really want to bring up that question in the context of these bills, because I want to help, I think everybody wants to help. We should find a way to help. But it seems to me that what we're doing now is putting forth a number of ideas and adopting them, and they contradict one another, they force competition within the state. I'm just not sure they make sense. And so at least I hope you will...
