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submit to you that you cannot stop research on this basis without hurting research in all other areas of the university. What we need to do, as regards the university, is continue to do the things that will make the institution something that the citizens of Nebraska can be proud of. I would like to yield whatever time I have left, Mr. Lieutenant Governor, to Senator Robak.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Robak, one minute.

SENATOR ROBAK: Oh, one minute, thank you, Mr. President. I had my light on, and I will speak again. I think I need to defend myself, I think I need to speak because I've been the target of this issue for some time now, and I don't understand why exactly. But I would just like to explain that...and I did pass this out to the entire body today, and anybody else that wants this, this...Jim Cunningham's article about me: Senator Robak caves in to pressure. I'd like to explain that, I hope I can do that in one minute. He's wrong in many parts of this where he says, bodies parts and such, but I'll skip to the...to the chase here. The only pressure I got was from Mr. Cunningham's group. I did sign on to this bill, yes, I did. I signed on this bill. My staff will know how I agonized over this bill, because I thought it was the right thing to do. However, when I found out that we're using fetal tissue cells because somewhere down in future, because of this research, and somebody else here can correct me if I am wrong on this, somewhere, due to this research,...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Time.

SENATOR ROBAK: ...we will have...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator.

SENATOR ROBAK: ...we will have...we will not be able to have to use fetal tissue again, we'll have synthesized cells right here...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Robak, your time has expired. Thank you, Senator Raikes. Senator Preister.
