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stop threatening us, but when I say what I'm going to do, I'm a mean man. I carry grudges and I'm unfair. Well, maybe I am, but in this particular instance, I think it's quite a bit of money to simply create a public relations person for the State Patrol. What is there to coordinate? This is something that the Patrol ought to be doing right now if there is a law enforcement role to be filled. If the Patrol is operating in a certain area, there is a cooperation between the Patrol and that local agency anyway. This would just be tacking on an extra thumb, and if somebody can show me a legitimate law enforcement justification for it, then I will not try to remove the money. But based on what Senator Wehrbein gave us, and he can only give us what they gave him, there is no law enforcement function involved in what this person does at all. The only connection with law enforcement is that the person will work with the Patrol, perhaps wear a uniform, and show a Patrol badge, I guess. Let me ask Senator Wehrbein another question, if I may, for clarification.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Wehrbein, will these be new hires?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And if the state does not pick them up at the end of three years, what becomes of them?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I don't know that answer.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Do you know how much federal money will be drawn as a result of the appropriation of this?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes, over the three years, that's \$450,000 of federal money and \$570,000 of state money,...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: That, oh, excuse me.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: ...over the three years.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And after that period if the program is to continue it will be all state money?
