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SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Thank you, Madam President, members of the Legislature, thank you. Senator Raikes, I appreciate the opportunity to talk about what did happen with last year's property tax plan and how some of that occurred. And one of the...the numbers that you passed out, I also passed out some numbers and, members, I want to revisit with you a little bit of what we did do last year with community colleges. We did put \$30 million of property tax relief into the community college formula. The issue becomes, did people get \$30 million of property tax relief? The figures that I've put out to you show what the property tax would have been, and then it shows what actual property tax was levied, and there is a 30 million dollar difference. The difference, I think, Senator Raikes, between your numbers and my numbers are that that aid was put through operations, through the operational aid formula, and not through things like...the capital levy was not included on that nor the ADA or the hazardous materials removal. Actually, the hazardous materials and the ADA are kind of combined. There is a 1 cent levy allowable there for capital improvements, but we didn't send that through into those figures. And so what happens is that if you include those, you will show actually less in property tax savings and that's the reason I passed out this sheet to you. I think there was actually a 30 million dollar savings that occurred and I'll talk to you off the mike to explain it because I see a puzzled look and I probably have a puzzled voice, but I'm fairly confident the way this formula works that it is a dollar for dollar property tax relief. I think what Senator Raikes raises is a different issue and that's the issue of where best do you put your money. Do you put it into the cash reserve, return some of that to the credit? Do you return it all to the credit? Do you put some back into the community college? And I'll just repeat, I think our position last year was there is an actual dollar for dollar relief when you put it through the community college formula. It's unlike if you put it through the K-12 TEEOSA type formulas, that this, actually the way the various community colleges are structured and the way that the aid program is put together, you can target to those people less property taxes, and really what they did is they cut their levies in half. And I still think it's a good policy, one that we should follow. Senator Raikes raises the issue I think that's also legitimate for discussion is, are we
