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I have some of the same concerns that Senator Kristensen articulated, as if we would have done the Kristensen amendment, which would have been a reallocation. This is new spending and, Senator Wehrbein, it was my understanding from some of the comments by Senator Chambers that there has been a discussion going on possibly with the Governor as to how this may fit in and may not be vetoed, which then makes me think of the reality that we all have to be aware of and that I'm sure you would have done in your closing, as Chair of the Appropriations Committee, that if the \$500,000 is new money and if it's not vetoed, then it's going to come out of somewhere out of those things that we've already passed. And, you know, all of us have pieces of legislation out there. This will be new spending. Senator Cudaback has a bill out there for two new judges that happened to just be...that happens to be \$500,000. All of us have other bills. That's the reality of it that we have to face rather than the reallocation. And so I'm going to listen to the discussion and the discussion that Senator Wehrbein may have and the explanation as to the discussion that's going on with the Governor and where that leads us. We had a good discussion yesterday as far as the recruitment and what we need to do, my preference would have been the reallocation. I'll listen before I vote on this, but I'm concerned and I'm...I think it's important that all of us are aware of, if this isn't vetoed, it's got to come out of somewhere else and it's got to come out of some piece of legislation that we've passed along. So, with that, I give my remaining time to the Chair. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Bohlke. (Doctor of the day introduced.) We're now open for discussion on the Wehrbein amendment. Seeing no lights, Senator Wehrbein.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Thank you, Mr. President, members. I'll simply close by saying that it is exactly what you see. I have not had a conversation with the Governor myself. I realize the university will have those discussions. That is simply...it's laid out, as it is here, to take its place among all other things. And I have no, let's say, deals; I have no understandings myself at all with the Governor. This is additional money. Remembering that we have not put all the money for the health insurance at the University of Nebraska, for example, we have been very frugal along those lines. In my
