SENATOR HILGERT: Yes, I...yes, I have.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Do you forgive those who trespassed against you?

SENATOR HILGERT: Yes, I do.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: All the...

SENATOR HILGERT: I try to.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: In every case?

SENATOR HILGERT: No, I do not, not in every case. Sometimes I fail.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Hilgert, when I was discussing in my prior exchange with you an incident that took place in the Rotunda, which I hadn't given the location of before, do you feel you were trespassed against by the way you were dealt with by the vocalizer? Let me change that. Let me ask it a different way because other...various people have different standards. If you conducted yourself toward a person in the way the vocalizer conducted himself toward you, would you feel that you were trespassing against that person if you treated them in that manner? Or is that the method by which you deal with people who have not offended or trespassed against you in any respect?

SENATOR HILGERT: No, I probably would...I probably wouldn't have...I probably would feel that that was somewhat of a "trespassation" but I haven't really given this a lot of thought.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And that's why I want you to think about it now. You could be deemed to have been trespassed against by people who were aware of what happened, would you agree with that? Somebody else may have thought it was a trespass against you.

SENATOR HILGERT: Yes.
