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Revenue Committee twice and they have killed it twice so my record is probably like the rest of you, you know, not very good in the Revenue Committee. But anyway, I wanted to bring this to your attention for some discussion here on the floor. That looks like the only way I'm ever going to get it discussed on the floor. With that, thank you, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Janssen. For debate on the Janssen amendment to LB 171. Senator Chambers, followed by Wickersham, Beutler, Wehrbein and Landis. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, the only comment I will make just for procedural purposes, a rule that I was opposed to was adopted which said that if a bill is killed in committee and an attempt is made to offer that bill or a substantially similar version of it, it would take 30 votes. And the only reason I point it out just to let Senator Janssen know what he's up against here this afternoon. I'm sure the "Wizard" was probably just itching to do that so if I stole your thunder, allow me to do that every now and then. But that's all that I will have to say on this issue. I will watch to see how the discussion unfolds. At first, I thought it was trifling and frivolous. And then I listened to what Senator Janssen said and I'm kind of puzzled as to just what is involved here. Would some of this activity be considered a part of a business expense or just what that would justify a tax on the postage? I don't quite understand exactly what is going on here, but I will listen.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Wickersham.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Mr. President, members of the body, I rise in opposition to Senator Janssen's amendment with apologies to Senator Janssen. This is something that he feels very strongly about, and he has brought the issue twice to the Revenue Committee. The most recent version that Senator Janssen brought to the Revenue Committee was LB 245. As Senator Janssen noted in his opening, that bill was killed and, as Senator Chambers indicated, it would require 30 votes to adopt the amendment. The part of the discussion that Senator Chambers did not note for you concerning that rule, and that was one of the many times
